American delegation visits Essex

In 2025 Essex County Council signed a Memorandum of Understanding to recognise the historical and cultural ties that unite Essex and Virginia Beach, USA, and aims to promote business and cultural exchange.

Culture Essex worked with the Essex Growth Agency on the 'Welcome Home to Essex' campaign and co-hosted a reception for a delegation from the City of Virginia Beach and the Hampton Roads Alliance, a business consortium.

Hosted at the historic Layer Marney Tower, the delegation - which included Virginia Beach Mayor, Bobby Dyer - met with local firms such as Tiptree based jam makers, Wilkin and Sons, and Witham based video games developer, Dlada Studios, to celebrate the launch of the tourism campaign that captures the historical connection between the two places.

Following the reception, the delegation was treated to a tour of the tower and an exhibition depicting key historic images, including photographs of United States Army Airforce servicemen on top of Colchester Castle during World War Two from the diaries at the Essex Record Office by E.J. Rusdale.

Free Festival of Essex Archaeology and Heritage returns to Cressing



The highly successful Festival of Essex Archaeology and Heritage is returning to Cressing Temple Barns this July.

On Thursday 23 July at the historic site, the free family friendly festival is back having proved to be highly popular last year.

This year's event aims to build on the success of 2025's inaugural festival and will feature even more exhibitors and reenactments to entertain visitors. It's ideal for all ages and anyone with an interest in archaeology, history and the heritage of Essex.

Owners of listed buildings and heritage professionals are also encouraged to attend the talks taking place.

Organised by Place Services at Essex County Council, this year's festival will once again bring the county's past to life through a programme of family activities,

museum exhibitions, archaeological organisations, societies re-enactment groups, falconry displays and much more.

Many of the exhibitors will be undercover in Cressing's historic wheat and barley barns so visitors can enjoy the event whatever the weather.

Tim Murphy, Place Services Historic Environment manager, added: "Last year's festival exceeded our expectations as we saw over 1,000 people of all ages visit, however, we want this year's event to be bigger and better.

"Within the county there are lots of fascinating historical assets which we want to celebrate and promote to the public as widely as possible.

"This festival is ideal for those who want to meet Essex's leading

experts and those involved in discovering, preserving and presenting the best of the county's heritage"

New heritage trails coming to Cressing

A range of new interactive walking trails are coming to Cressing Temple Barns as part of the Working Farm project.

From September visitors will be able to enjoy the new trails, which will be full of information at the push of a button or via a QR code.

Thanks to funding from the National Lottery, through Arts Council England, the Friends of Cressing Temple Barns have been busy with a project documenting the 900-year history of Cressing as a working farm.

Having restored some of the antique farm machinery to its former glory, the Friends are now working on eight new walking

trails - each focusing on a different era of Cressing's history.

From the Peasants' Revolt of 1381 to Cressing hosting 'land girls' during World War Two, the story of the site's rich farming history will be brought to life through storytelling and educational materials.

Sue Lowe, Chair of The Friends of Cressing Temple, said: "Many will be familiar with Cressing's majestic timber-framed barns but less well known is its rich and varied 900-year history as a working farm - from the 1100s right through to the 1980s.

"From this September visitors of all ages will be able to enjoy the new walking trails and gleaming machinery. Before then though you might catch a glimpse of us road-testing the trails, sprucing up the machinery or installing new signage and audiovisual equipment."



Water Stories to tell **Jumbo history**





A nine-month heritage filmmaking project for young people will focus on the links between Colchester's historic 'Jumbo' tower and global water supply issues.

'Water Stories' under The Jumbo Project programme, will train 12 to 18-year-olds to become heritage researchers, filmmakers and interpreters.

Backed by the Arts and Cultural Fund, Balcerne Water Tower, known as 'Jumbo', is Britain's largest surviving Victorian municipal water tower having been built in the 1800's during the 'Golden Age' of industrial water engineering.

The Grade II listed building – which is visible above the city skyline – was built using locally made bricks and originally supplied water for the city's first fire service. It also played a vital role in transforming public health by providing clean drinking water, this was at a time when cholera was devastating communities across England.

Building preservation trust and charity - North Essex Heritage - is leading The Jumbo Project. This once-in-a-generation scheme, made possible by The National Lottery Heritage Fund and players of the National Lottery, will restore the tower and re-purpose it into a visitor attraction and commercially viable, accessible heritage and events venue for the city.

The 'Water Stories' project will see the young people work with international charity, WaterAid, to make video content about Jumbo's

heritage, while drawing attention to today's global water issues, such as accessing clean water, climate change and environmental sustainability.

The young people will also take part in 16 sessions mixing research, group production, creative experimentation, technical skills and practical workshops in research and interviewing techniques.

They'll also research Jumbo's heritage, along with Colchester's water network through site visits, archive work and guided discussions.

The final film created by the projects participants will premiere at Jumbo's reopening event and will be projected inside the historic water tank.

Joseph Rawlings, Jumbo Project Programme Manager, said: "We are overjoyed to have the support of the Essex County Council Arts and Cultural Fund for the Water Stories project.

"Jumbo has been a key part of Colchester's water story since 1883, and we look forward to working with young people to creatively explore the importance of water on a local, national and international level."

Connecting communities through cinema

A programme of inclusive film events that aims to bring people together is being launched by the Electric Palace Cinema in Harwich, thanks to the Arts and Cultural Fund.

The programme – Community Screenings for Connection – will see guest speakers, screenings and workshops take place throughout the year.

This summer a special ‘Pride on Screen’ event in partnership with Manningtree Pride featuring guest speakers takes place. The programme also features the nostalgic Memory Matinee Revivals with sing-along workshops on Monday 3 and Wednesday 19 August.

As part of the programme the venue also hosted a screening for Autism Acceptance Month - in partnership with Connect Without Limits – during April.

The Community Screenings for Connection programme also builds on the cinema’s wider Electric Palace Archive Project – which is funded by the National Lottery Heritage Fund – to help preserve over a century of cinema and Harwich’s unique cultural heritage.

The Electric Palace Cinema, a Grade II listed building, opened on Wednesday 29 November in 1911, and the first film shown was “The Battle of Trafalgar and The Death of Nelson”.

Unfortunately, the cinema closed in 1956 after it was damaged by the East Coast Floods in 1953. However, it re-opened in 1981 and retained the original screen, projection room and frontage as well as much of the original interior.

In November 2006, British actor Clive Owen became patron of the cinema (at his first official visit he launched an appeal to raise funds to repair this historic building) and in May 2021 the cinema was used as a location for ‘Downton Abbey: A New Era’.

Isobel Keith, Electric Palace Archive Project Manager, said: “We’re delighted to launch Community Screenings for Connection, which is designed to bring people together, celebrate diversity and support wellbeing across the local community.

“The Electric Palace Cinema is a wonderful historic asset for the county, and we’re pleased to create new opportunities for people to engage with Harwich’s unique cultural heritage.”

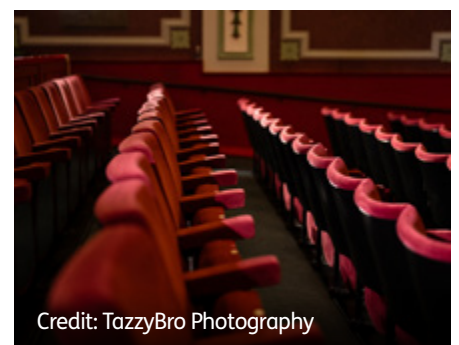

The story of the boat that rocked



At 12.00pm on Easter Sunday (March 28) in 1964, a pirate broadcast transmitted over the nation's airwaves which would change the UK radio industry.

As the Rolling Stones hit 'Not Fade Away' played over the airwaves, listeners were introduced for the first time to Radio Caroline.

Founded by Ronan O'Rahilly, the ship 'MV Caroline' (a former passenger ferry) was stationed in international waters off the coast of Suffolk to avoid the British broadcasting regulations at the time. In fact, five different ships were used as a broadcasting base during Radio Caroline's time on the airwaves.

Designed to fill a musical gap left by the BBC's limited pop music programming, Radio Caroline changed not only the face of the UK broadcasting industry, but it also launched the careers of many DJ's who are still on air today.

While Chris Moore is often cited as

the first voice to be broadcasted on Radio Caroline, the pirate station also launched the careers of Tony Blackburn, Johnnie Walker, Dave Lee Travis (DLT), Simon Dee and many more.

Now, a new musical and an illustrated talk celebrating the famous ship and bringing its history to life is to take place at Colchester's Mercury Theatre.

From Wednesday 3 to Saturday 13 June, the East Anglian Touring Consortium present 'Caroline: A New Musical – The Pirate Radio Station That Rocked The Airwaves'.

Set in 1964 in Clacton-on-Sea, the musical sees Caroline and her best friend Mary spend their days stacking shelves only to return home to their mothers listening to Housewives Choice on the BBC. Every night they escape to the pier

to eat chips, laugh and talk about music with Caroline's charismatic boyfriend Robbie.

However, Robbie lands a shock gig with Radio Caroline – the pirate radio station – and overnight, Caroline is hurled into a whirlwind of music, mischief and a cultural rebellion that will rewrite history.

Powered by the sound of the 1960s, the musical is a bold and funny new production about love, ambition and finding the courage to turn up the volume on your own voice.

Also, and taking place on Friday 12 June, is a one hour illustrated talk by Ray Clark - 'Radio Caroline: The True Story of the Boat that Continues to Rock'.

Ray will be delving into the history of Radio Caroline and pirate radio in general and his talk will focus on

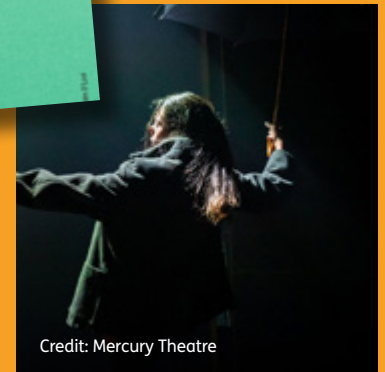

the station's importance in the evolution of radio in the UK.

Its days as an offshore pirate broadcasting station ended on November 5 1990, as the station was facing legal pressures and the last song played on Radio Caroline was Charlie Deore's 'Pilot of the Airwaves'.

In May 2017, OFCOM awarded the station an AM band community licence to broadcast to Suffolk and north Essex. However, it wasn't until December 22 2017 that Radio Caroline began full-time broadcasting by using a redundant BBC World Service frequency and transmitter mast at Orford Ness.

Today, Radio Caroline is still broadcasting, albeit as a legal land-based station and operating as an internet and digital service.

Calling budding playwrights...

Community projects to connect people

Discover Arts and Cultural Fund community projects using sound to connect people this summer.

Community Music Projects in Clacton, Colchester and Maldon

A series of Community Music projects for youth groups is being launched.

CLIP Sound and Music will deliver three five-week programmes with organisations supporting communities who may face barriers to creative opportunities. Each programme will use music-making to build confidence, develop skills and create social connections.

In Colchester, CLIP will work with The Outhouse to support LGBTQ+ young people to create podcasts. Participants at African Families in the UK Community Interest Company will explore DJing and music production in Clacton-on-Sea. Finally, in Maldon, students at Mid Essex Co-operative Academy will take part in sound and music workshops.

Across the projects, CLIP will create welcoming spaces for young people to experiment and express themselves through music.

Essex Voices: Creative community and storytelling project Phoenix FM

'Essex Voices: Stories from Our Communities' is a creative community radio and podcast project led by Phoenix FM giving local people the opportunity to tell their own stories on air.

Backed by the Arts and Cultural Fund, a series of free workshops will be held across Essex where participants and Phoenix FM volunteers will create original programmes to be broadcast on Phoenix FM and released as podcasts.

The project will work with around 60 participants from a range of backgrounds, including young people, older residents and those at risk of social isolation.

The resulting series will explore themes such as local identity, hidden histories and everyday life in Essex. Alongside the broadcasts, community listening events will bring audiences together to hear and discuss the programmes.

Audio recordings will be taking place June to September 2026.

Busking for young people

Roman River Festival, Colchester and Tendring, Berryfield Buskers

Berryfield Buskers is set to bring a lively new layer of enjoyment to two local art hubs, the vibrant Firstsite in Colchester and the historic Jaywick Martello Tower. The project will give young people aged eight to 18-years-old the opportunity to 'busk' on a weekend afternoon once a month.

Conceived of and produced by Roman River Music - and supported by the Arts and Cultural Fund - it's inspired by the success of a free Roman River Festival family concert in the Open (Berryfield) Mosaic space at Firstsite last Autumn. It drew a crowd of over 100 people one Sunday afternoon due to the popularity of the young artist spotlight performances.

Thaxted Festival: 40th Anniversary

Friday 19 June to Sunday 12 July

This year Thaxted Festival celebrates a remarkable milestone – its 40th anniversary. Having begun in 1986 as a bold revival of a historic musical tradition, it has grown into one of the UK's leading independent music festivals featuring a vibrant celebration of artistry, community and place.

While the modern festival began prior to 1986, Thaxted's musical heritage stretches back much further. The early 20th-century composer Gustav Holst (known for 'The Planets'), brought music-making to the town through the Whitsuntide festivals which he developed together with Thaxted's Rector, Fr Conrad Noel.

Exhibitions to commemorate 250-years of artist **John Constable**



The Haywain

Colchester and Ipswich Museums are celebrating the 250th anniversary of artist John Constable with three landmark exhibitions.

Born in East Bergholt in 1776, Constable became one of the country's most important painters before his death in 1837 at the age of 60.

He was an English Romantic painter well known for his bucolic landscapes, which are generally considered some of the most popular and valuable in British art. Now, and to commemorate his life and art, the year-long exhibitions will feature a programme of works and activities.

Supported by The National Lottery Heritage Fund, the Weston Loan Programme with Art Fund, Arts Council England, and other key partners, the exhibitions will run from Saturday 28 March to Sunday 28 February 2027.

The exhibitions will showcase rare and internationally significant artworks on loan from the Tate, Victoria and Albert Museum, Royal Academy, National Galleries of Scotland and the Government Art Collection.

Forthcoming exhibitions include:

Constable: A Cast of Characters

Now until Sunday 14 June

Featuring personal letters, period costume and historical artefacts, the exhibition focuses on those who inspired and supported John Constable. Works from Colchester and Ipswich Museums will be on display along with loans from private collectors. A new sculpture by artist and descendant, Sarah Constable, will also be available to view.

Constable: Walking the Landscape

Saturday 11 July to
Sunday 4 October

This three-month exhibition celebrates Constable's connection to the countryside that inspired him and that he loved. The exhibition will feature rarely seen works on loan and his most personal paintings from his childhood home.

Constable to Contemporary

Saturday 24 October to
Sunday 28 February 2027

The final exhibition will highlight the relevancy and legacy of Constable's works and will feature new works by local artists and community groups.

New exhibition coming to Firstsite



This summer Firstsite will be transformed by the powerful, immersive work of artist Godfried Donkor.

Free to enter, his exhibition - 'It's a Numbers Game' - offers something for everyone. A powerful and immersive experience, a deeper look at shared histories and a chance to see one of the UK's most distinctive contemporary artists at a major moment in his career.

Godfried presents his first solo exhibition in a UK public art gallery at Firstsite from Saturday 23 May to Sunday 30 August.

From his longtime Brixton studio, Godfried interrogates the layered social and historical relationships connecting Africa, Europe and the Caribbean.

For this exhibition, he's created a series of monumental new works that uncover these intertwined histories through themes of masculinity, military culture, iconic female leaders and resisters and the complexity of their representation.

His layered works explore how history is shaped and seen in different ways over time. Through unexpected contrasts combining images of trade, empire and global finance, Godfried explores how histories between Britain, West Africa and the Caribbean are formed and reformed, including connections between Colchester's past and Ghana.

Boxing is also a recurring theme, representing movement, struggle and exchange across cultures and continents. At Firstsite, this comes to life in a full gallery transformed into a boxing ring.

A specially commissioned hand-painted mural, reflecting on Roman runners and animated across Firstsite's iconic curved wall, completes the exhibition.

Godfried said: "Histories are layered, repeated and reinterpreted over time. Through combining different visual languages, materials and archives, I explore how history and power are not fixed, but entwined and shaped through exchange, memory and perspective.

"At Firstsite, this is grounded in Colchester's own story, connecting Boudicca's resistance to that of Yaa Asantewaa, and to Sarah Bowditch's 19th century documentation of the Ashanti. These histories are not separate, but part of the same ongoing conversation, continuing to shift, overlap and reveal new meanings as they are seen again."

‘Phantom Power’ comes to Focal Point Gallery

Multidisciplinary artist and musician Rosie Ridgway is to present ‘Phantom Power’, her first solo exhibition at Focal Point Gallery in Southend-on-Sea.

Taking place from Wednesday 24 June to Saturday 12 September, Rosie’s practice spans sound, performance, sculpture and costume.

Rosie’s work reinterprets cultural phenomena to construct alternative realities, often through collaborative and participatory approaches that generate humour and absurdity.

At its core, Rosie’s practice is driven by experimentation, a celebration of difference and a commitment to accessibility.

Her installation situates the audience intimately within the dynamics of a band rehearsal

space. Transforming the gallery into a hybrid setting, part studio, part game world, visitors are invited to select and embody their own band characters.

Rooted in the idea of “creative chaos,” the work embraces the unpredictability of bringing together individuals with distinct lives and experiences, all shaped by external forces, and examines how these dynamics influence a group’s ability to function.

Blurring the boundaries between player, performer and audience, the installation encourages active participation, with visitors shaping their experience through movement, interaction and collective presence.

At its heart, the exhibition unfolds as a loose quest, a search for new forms of kinship beyond biology or shared history. It gestures toward a collective belonging built through chance, curiosity and a willingness to step into the unknown.

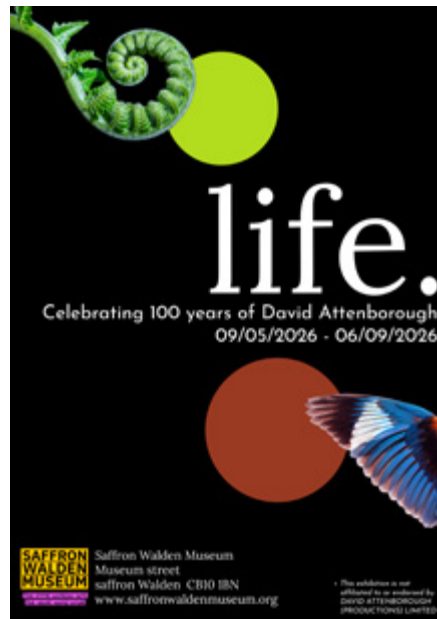

A television programme that boosted local tourism and put the Essex antique industry on the map could be revived for modern audiences.

The highly popular 'Lovejoy' – a comedy-drama series that followed the loveable rogue 'Lovejoy' played by actor Ian McShane – is set to return to screens after 30 years since the programme last aired.

Based on the novels by John Grant, who wrote them using the pen name Jonathan Gash, 'Lovejoy' aired on the BBC from 10 January 1986 until 4 December 1994.

Adapted for television by Ian La Frenais, the programme ran for 71 episodes over six series and focused on the adventures of the rogue antiques dealer in East Anglia and his friends and colleagues 'Tinker', 'Eric' and 'Lady Felsham'.

Throughout the series 'Lovejoy' was portrayed as a 'divvy' (or 'divvie'), a slang term in the antiques industry to describe someone who can identify genuine antiques and instantly recognise fakes.

Filmed in in the picturesque areas of Essex and Suffolk - mainly in the Stour Valley - the programme also shot scenes in the areas surrounding Braintree, Coggeshall, Halstead, Hedingham Castle and Long Melford.

Now, production company See-Saw Films (producers of TV programmes 'Slow Horses' and 'The Kings Speech') have acquired the rights to the novels and are looking to revive the popular programme for modern audiences.

Not only did 'Lovejoy' put the antiques industry on the map, but it also drew visitors to Essex from further afield and proved to be a boon to the local tourism sector.

An Essex Film Office spokesperson said: "The beloved drama really helped to showcase the pretty historic villages and towns in Essex to both a national and international audience.

"The charm of the places that were in the production of 'Lovejoy' has never gone away, and we'd be very keen to welcome film companies to Essex to showcase 'Lovejoy' to a new generation."

Starring Essex: Meet the craftspeople working behind the scenes on the world's biggest movies



Did you know that when you're marvelling at sweeping maritime scenes in blockbuster films, that a boatyard in Maldon is often responsible for helping to create the magic?

Founded and led by marine engineer Jim Dines, Heritage Marine has evolved from a traditional shipyard into a specialist provider for film and television. Jim's career spans decades from serving as an Engineer Officer in the Royal Fleet Auxiliary to working on the design and build of two 40,000-ton tankers for the Ministry of Defence.

Today, his passion for maritime heritage fuels a unique enterprise that blends engineering precision with creative artistry.

Heritage Marine doesn't just restore historic vessels - it builds entire worlds for film. From authentic World War Two landing craft to fantastic flying ships, Heritage Marine's expertise has supported some of the most ambitious film projects.

In recent years its supported:

- Guillermo del Toro's 'Frankenstein' (2025), produced by Netflix. The team designed and shipped a full-size 120ft rigged vessel to Canada, then flew out to spend five weeks rigging the ship, standing by as specialist advisers on the shoot.
- 'Paddington III: Paddington in Peru' (2024), produced by StudioCanal and Heyday Films. The team rigged and supplied maritime props and set decoration for gimballed boat sets, built rope bridges and provided marine training for cast and crew.
- Paramount's 'A Quiet Place: Day One' (2024), directed by Michael Sarnoski. The company supplied and operated a 1914 steel coaster as the hero ship for dramatic dockside scenes.



And that's just a glimpse of at the most recent work in a portfolio that spans 'Game of Thrones', 'Wonder Woman', 'Death on the Nile' and many more.

Through the Heritage Marine Foundation, Jim and his team are passing on these rare skills to young people, ensuring the preservation of maritime heritage while creating pathways into the film industry.

Essex based 'horror chocolatier'

Guillermo del Toro's production of 'Frankenstein' also selected another Essex based supplier to work with for their adaptation of Mary Shelly's gothic novel. They opted to use authentic, handcrafted props to help realise chilling yet realistic effects on screen.



This is where a rather unusual supplier, Sarah Hardy, Essex based 'horror chocolatier' and founder of 'The Edible Museum' in Sible Hedingham, came in. Sarah was commissioned to craft 'jewel like' chocolate beetles in a precise palette, with colours that tied back to the narrative and specific characters (for instance red hues to reflect Frankenstein's mother).

Sarah delivered a stock of anatomically accurate pieces made of milk, dark and white chocolate, combining her sculpting background and mould-making techniques to achieve hyper-realistic results. The crew loved them and ordered more immediately.

Sarah's craft reflects years of experience earning recognition from Guillermo del Toro himself, who chose her authentic craftsmanship over CGI and AI for this project.

Sarah Hardy was also recruited to create giant strawberries for the 2026 'Wuthering Heights' film directed by Emerald Fennell. The artist spent a whole weekend making 20 strawberries designed for Margot Robbie to bite into on screen, they were crafted from sugar paste, modelling chocolate and tiny dyed sesame seeds to appear realistic yet surreal.

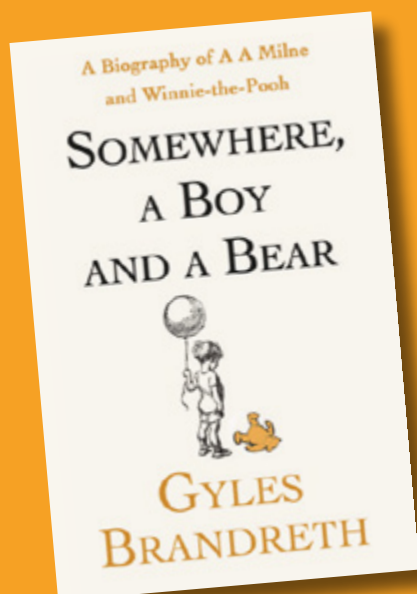

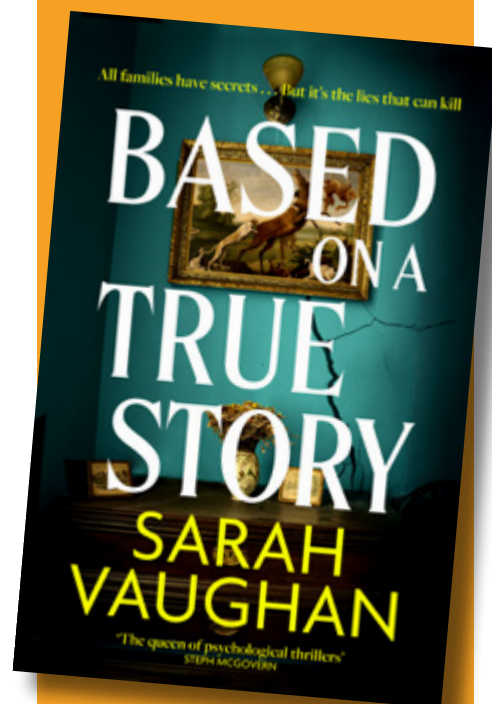
