The Lakes

Explore the picturesque lakes, a haven for wildlife, created by damming Weald Brook which runs through the park. Take the circular path around the main lake and feed the ducks by purchasing duck food from the visitor centre. What can you spot?



Chestnut Avenue and The Forest

Take a walk through Chestnut Avenue into enchanting woodlands. Discover some impressive veteran oak, hornbeam and horse chestnut trees, some of which are 500-years-old or more.

Fallow Deer Enclosure

Meet these delightful creatures. Buy food from the visitor centre and use the special feeding chutes. Created to celebrate and recognise the history of Weald as a medieval deer park. You can also spot wild deer in the forest if you're lucky.

Stick Man Trail

Fun for all the family. Follow the Stick Man trail inspired by the bestselling books by Julia Donaldson and Alex Scheffler. Multiple play areas, just under 2km, suitable for a wide-range of ages. Trail map available to buy from the visitor centre.

Belvedere Mound and Folly

Climb the mound for a romantic spot rich in history. Explore the remains of 'The Temple' an 18th century folly built in the times of the rich landowners and Weald Hall.

The mound can be climbed from the west or there are paths from the south and east which have a gentler elevation.
